THE GREEN LEADERSHIP'S METHODOLOGY

Introduction

Production Not Products

We find far too many metal pots and pans and demand that these be thrown out. The many electrical tools in the garage and kitchen must also go. And so, the tirade continues.

Before doing this, the Green leaders realised most citizens would be appalled with such behaviour, and membership numbers and donations to the Green Movement would drastically drop, threatening the very existence of the movement. So how do we force these dumb frogs to accept the lifestyle we have designed for them?

We hatch a cunning plan. Rather than banning products in thousands of homes, we should attack the means of producing those products.
